Where might I find a reputable treatment guideline from another publicly funded health system?

The National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) provides guidance, sets quality standards and manages a national database to improve people's health and prevent and treat ill health. NICE makes recommendations to the National Health Service (NHS) on new and existing medications, treatments and procedures, including drug appraisals relating to specific diseases. The database located at <http://www.nice.org.uk/Guidance/CG/Published> may be searched alphabetically, by organ system or by date.



Where should I look for Canadian Standards of Practice in oncology?



CAPhO is the Canadian national forum for oncology pharmacy practitioners and other health care professionals interested in oncology pharmacy. The bilingual website <http://www.capho.org/about.htm> offers wide access to members and non-members alike. The Standards of Practice for Oncology Pharmacy in Canada (Nov 2009) are located in the 'ABOUT' tab. Online learning opportunities are located in the 'EDUCATION' tab. Presentation slides from previous National Oncology Pharmacy Symposia are located in the 'NOPS' tab by year.

We hope everyone enjoyed the AGM and Educational Sessions! Thank you to the organizing committee for providing SDIS the opportunity to present a poster. Karen Jensen represented us and thoroughly enjoyed the event. Thank you also for all the support CSHP-Sk Branch has provided us over the years. An aspect of this support is the space offered to us in PostScript to keep everyone informed about our little corner of the world.

We continue to encourage all hospital pharmacists to utilize SDIS for drug information needs. We certainly welcome queries from all other health care professionals as well so feel free to refer physicians / nurses / dieticians etc. As a reminder, our phone numbers are **1 (800) 667-3425** (within Saskatchewan); **966-6340** (Saskatoon area). Queries can be sent via our website at www.druginfo.usask.ca. Our website now has information relating to the drug shortages; we are working to make this information as complete as possible.

Below is an example of a question we have fielded from a hospital pharmacist in the last six months. References have not been included in the interest of saving space but don't hesitate to request them should you be interested.

Q: A physician asked whether or not octreotide can be used for patients with a lymphocele in the groin?

A: The effect of octreotide on lymph flow has been reported after such procedures as renal transplantation and node dissection associated with mastectomy and prostatectomy. In all of the studies, octreotide's effects on lymph flow and drainage duration were the primary outcomes (or interests). Lymphocele formations, in the context of complications, were reported in only two papers; a trend toward fewer lymphoceles was found with the octreotide groups. A case of a lymphatic fistula healing subsequent to administration of somatostatin and octreotide (somatostatin was considered to be more effective) has been reported. There is no research examining octreotide's effect on existing lymphoceles. It may be reasonable to believe octreotide has the potential to prevent formation of lymphoceles associated with lymphorrhea; certainly more studies are required and the studies need to evaluate lymphocele formation as a primary outcome.

37th Annual Banff Seminar Call for Abstracts

It's that time again!

The 37th annual Banff Seminar is on the horizon, and it's time to think about submitting abstracts for posters. Poster presenters at the Banff Seminar are given the opportunity to share the results of recent research with a large number of hospital pharmacists from across the country. It is an excellent opportunity to gain exposure for research.

As in previous years, abstracts must be submitted electronically, and will be accepted until 18:00h CST January 7th, 2011. Confirmation of receipt of each submission will be sent within 3 days, and authors of chosen abstracts will be notified by January 28, 2011. Abstracts are judged based on scientific merit, originality, level of interest, significance to CSHP/CAPT members, and compliance with poster abstract criteria. All poster presentations are welcome, but preference will be given to original (i.e. not previously presented) research, and only novel posters will be eligible for judging at the Seminar.

New for this year, all posters that directly relate to CSHP 2015 Initiatives will be recognized at the 37th Annual Banff Seminar.

Privacy Commissioner

Issues Report

The Privacy Commissioner of Saskatchewan investigated a complaint alleging that a pharmacist had inappropriately accessed personal health information on the Pharmaceutical Information Program (PIP). He found that a breach of The Health Information Protection Act had occurred, and issued a report on March 23, 2010. The report was made public generating considerable media attention.

In his report, the Commissioner made several recommendations directed at the pharmacy, the regional health authority, the Ministry of Health and the Saskatchewan College of Pharmacists (SCP) towards improving security of PIP and preventing recurrence. Because of the significant implications of his recommendations, we prepared a submission asking for clarification and explanation of a number of his findings, conclusions and recommendations. We continue to consult with the Commissioner to reach a common understanding. In the meantime, we agree with his conclusion that carelessly accessing PIP or accessing PIP out of curiosity is strictly prohibited. We also continue to promote pharmacist use of PIP in the course of providing pharmaceutical care. In particular we advise members that you:

1) Continue to use PIP for its intended purpose by accessing the patient's profile:

- 1) When a patient-pharmacist relationship exists;
- 2) During the course of providing prescription service, or when advising on non-prescription medications;
- 3) When the information is needed to identify, prevent or resolve a drug related problem; or
- 4) When required or authorized by law.

Remember that "The PIP data shall NOT be accessed, used or disclosed by a pharmacist for personal interest, gossip or financial gain". – SCP Guidelines.
